Technology, when used effectively, has the power to amplify learning outcomes—through digital platforms, immersive simulations, interactive content, and collaborative problem-solving exercises that cater to diverse



learning needs.

Embracing open educational resources (OERs) and leveraging the global digital commons can democratize access to quality learning materials. In doing so, we empower students from every walk of life—urban and rural, girls and boys, children with disabilities and those from marginalized communities—to participate actively and meaningfully in their education journey. This is the kind of inclusivity we must champion if we are to build a truly sustainable future.

Key to this transformation is the continued investment in teachers. Teachers are the heart of the education system. Their professional development, ongoing mentorship, and wellbeing must remain a top priority.
